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The Organization

The Tri-County Health Network (TCHN) started the Food Policy Council (FPC) Initiative after receiving a grant from University of South Carolina SNAP-Ed. This FPC is a grassroots effort to bring diverse members of Bamberg, Orangeburg, and Calhoun Counties together to:

- Increase healthy food access,
- Educate all stakeholders about the connection between healthy food and good health;
- Increase local farmers' market share,
- · Develop food policy recommendations, and
- Increase community awareness.





AREA RESOURCES

The tri-county area is located between Columbia and Charleston, South Carolina. All three counties are robust in farm land and poised to grow economically. Local farmers supply grocery stores and some farmers allow residents to glean after harvest. One action team's focus is local farmers and land use.

There are three universities and two technical colleges: SC State, Claflin, and Voorhees; Denmark Technical College and Orangeburg-Calhoun Technical College. SC State recently acquired 200 acres in Olar, SC (Bamberg County) for a new research farm. SC State has both a degree in agribusiness and a new farming degree under Health and Consumer Sciences. These resources are available to the councils as they develop.

Community champions and residents are the greatest resources. They are committed to improving the food system for the benefit of the entire community. TCHN is committed to increasing healthy food access as a strategy for reducing hypertension, obesity, and diabetes.





COUNCIL STRUCTURE

The Tri- County FPC will have representatives from each county chapter. Orangeburg County has the second largest landmass in South Carolina. Therefore, it will have three sectors: Eastern, Central, and Western Orangeburg. The Bamberg Chapter will serve as a model for Calhoun and Orangeburg chapters. Each local chapter will have leaders and community action groups. Startup action groups are: local food access, farmers/land use, and development.



Data

DATA METHOD

Data collected for this Community Food Assessment (CFA) is a startup tool for the FPC. The first method used to gather information related to healthy food access, was community surveys. Initial surveys were conducted in public housing communities. Action group meetings and Food Gatherings provided community members opportunities for open discussions. Those meetings and interviews provided grassroots information about the communities.

The initial surveys focused on consumption, access, and barriers to healthy food access. Another survey added questions about chronic illness diagnosis. Survey responses are included in this assessment. Community



Food Assessments will be ongoing to keep data current, identify improvements or setbacks to healthy food access, and encourage continued community contributions to the council. These practices will allow the Tri-County Food Policy council to make solid policy recommendations and advocate for constituents.

DEMOGRAPHICS: BAMBERG COUNTY

Households and Families

In 2016-2020, there were 5,070 households in Bamberg County, South Carolina. The average household size was 2.59 people.


Married-couple households made up 45.0 percent of the households in Bamberg County, South Carolina while cohabiting couple households made up 5.6 percent of households. Female householders with no spouse or partner present were 35.2 percent of all households, while 14.2 percent of households were male householders with no spouse or partner present. Of people living alone, 12.1 percent were male householders, and 17.5 percent were female householders, for a total of 29.6 percent of all households.

In Bamberg County, South Carolina, 27.9 percent of all households have one or more people under the age of 18; 42.8 percent of all households have one or more people 65 years and over.


Grandparents and grandchildren



Nursery school enrollment was 70 and kindergarten through 12th grade enrollment was 2,243. College or graduate school enrollment was 1,468.

Income

The median income of households in Bamberg County, South Carolina was \$42,830. An estimated 6.8 percent of households had income below \$10,000 a year and 0.4 percent had income over \$200,000 or more.

An estimated 66.1 percent of households received earnings. An estimated 29.5 percent of all households receiving SNAP were families with a female householder and no spouse present. An estimated 18.0 percent of households receiving SNAP had two or more workers in the past 12 months.

Households and Families

In 2016-2020, there were 6,221 households in Calhoun County, South Carolina. The average household size was 2.32 people.

Married-couple households made up 47.7 percent of the households in Calhoun County, South Carolina while cohabiting couple households made up 1.7 percent of households. Female householders with no spouse or partner present were 33.0 percent of all households, while 17.6 percent of households were male householders with no spouse or partner present. Of people living alone, 14.5 percent were male householders, and 17.7 percent were female householders, for a total of 32.2 percent of all households.

In Calhoun County, South Carolina, 26.0 percent of all households have one or more people under the age of 18; 42.0 percent of all households have one or more people 65 years and over.





In 2016-2020, there were 33,629 households in Orangeburg County, South Carolina. The average household size was 2.50 people.





SOURCES FOR FRESH FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

Grocery stores are the main source for healthy food. Farmers markets are a distant second. Farmers markets are seasonal and not always convenient in rural areas. Through the Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program, individuals sixty years and older, receive vouchers. SFMNP benefits local farmers and growers selling at farmer markets if they are able to accept SNAP. Most areas in the Tri-County are in food deserts. The City of Orangeburg is the largest municipality, however most of the city does not have close access to a grocery store.


DISTANCE FROM HOME TO REACH A STORE WITH FRESH FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

In the Tri-County area, 49 people said it takes them 2-5 minutes to drive to the nearest store with fresh fruit and vegetables. 58 people responded that it would take 6-10 minutes. 28 individuals said it would take 11-15 minutes. 30 people answered with 16-25 minutes and 24 people replied that it would take 30 minutes or more. On average it may take 7 minutes to drive 3.2 miles.



CHALLENGES TO ACCESSING HEALTHY FOOD


Cost represents approximately 36% of the challenges to purchasing healthy food. In action group sessions variety (28%) is different at different locations. Feedback at Food Gatherings and group meetings, suggested that produce quality (21%) purchased from local farmers was fresher than grocery stores.



FREQUENCY OF EATING MEALS PREPARED WITH FRESH FRUIT AND VEGETABLES


Survey responses indicate that individuals over 55 typically eat produce daily. Younger participants 20 and below consume fruit and vegetables fewer times per week. Listening sessions revealed that time and knowing how to prepare fresh produce are barriers for younger consumers choosing not to eat fresh vegetables. Another barrier to maximizing the health benefits of fresh produce is preparation; adding sodium, sugar and certain types of meat.

Note: Some parents answered for their children under 20 years of age. This was a low number, but was included in the responses.




DIAGNOSED ILLNESSES

According to the TCHN Community Health improvement Plan (CHIP) the three chronic diseases in the Tri-County are hypertension, diabetes and obesity. The survey results. During discussions in listening sessions this questions ask if there has been a diagnois of obesity. Although some participants have not been diagnosed with obesity, they agreed that they are overweight.



NUTRITION & HEALTH SERVICES

The survey results were not separated by age and income. The results are based on the number of individuals who completed the survey. On the chart U represents participants answered neither and those who didn't answer the question. 35% receive SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) benefits and 16% percent participate in the Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC).





Observations

The following observations are based on survey responses, comments at action group meetings, and interviews.



- Orangeburg County is the largest agricultural producer in the state of South Carolina. Calhoun County ranks number 16, and Bamberg number 25.
- Food insecurity scores: Bamberg 31, Orangeburg
 26, Calhoun County 39.
- Calhoun County has one major grocery store chain located in St. Matthews. The other stores are smaller and spread throughout the county. So, there are pockets of food deserts in Calhoun County.
- Food distributions: Family Health Center (Harvest Hope) distributes approximately 200 food boxes per month at seven locations. FHC also participates in food FoodShare Veggie Rx. TCHN distributions averages about 250 produce boxes at community events. Churches across the three counties engage in food distributions.
- There are drive-thru distributions throughout the tri-county. However, home bound and/or people without transportation are not served. For example, Denmark's produce distribution built in a delivery service for home bound individuals. The list grew from nineteen to sixty. A local church in Bamberg County started a mobile market for outlying areas.

- Action groups addressed concern about cost variants within the same food chain. Prices are higher in smaller towns. Residents with transportation travel to larger towns to shop. Lack of transportation force other residents to pay higher prices.
- Younger residents and young adult SNAP recipients need budgeting, shopping, and healthy food preparation workshops.
- Colleges and university food pantries need cold storage for fruit and prepackaged produce.
 Students, faculty, and staff have the same battle with diabetes, obesity, and hypertension.
- Local governments and officials need training on their roles and contribution to the FPC.
- Most of the grocery stores in Orangeburg are clustered on the western side of town. The Neighborhood Market and one other grocery store are on Hwy 301 South. Therefore, the majority of the city limits are food deserts. All income levels, homeowners and renters are impacted by the lack of grocery stores within the city.
- The trend is to put grocery stores in clusters rather than have smaller community stores with quality healthy food.



Next Steps

Grassroots efforts by community members made this food assessment a reality. The FPC can use this assessment to act by:
